This course enables students to create media art works using available and emerging technologies such as computer animation, digital imaging, video, and a variety of media. Students will explore the elements and principles of media arts, the connections between contemporary media art works and traditional art forms, and the importance of using responsible practices when engaged in the creative process. Students will develop the skills necessary to create and interpret media art works.

Curriculum

Students final report card grade will be based on the evidence provided of these overall curriculum expectations:

A. CREATING AND PRESENTING

A1. The Creative Process: apply the creative process to create media art works, individually and/or collaboratively;

A2. The Principles of Media Arts: design and produce media art works, applying principles of media arts and using various elements from contributing arts (dance, drama, music, visual arts);

A3. Using Technologies, Tools, and Techniques: apply traditional and emerging technologies, tools, and techniques to produce and present media art works for a variety of audiences and purposes.

B. REFLECTING, RESPONDING, AND ANALYSING

B1. The Critical Analysis Process: demonstrate an understanding of the critical analysis process by examining, interpreting, assessing, and reflecting on media art works;

B2. Identity and Values: demonstrate an understanding of how media art works reflect personal and cultural identity, and affect personal, cultural, and community values and their awareness of those values;

B3. Connections Beyond the Classroom: demonstrate an understanding of the types of knowledge and skills developed in media arts and how they can be used outside the media arts classroom.

C. FOUNDATIONS

C1. Terminology: demonstrate an understanding of, and use correct terminology when referring to, elements, principles, and other concepts relating to media arts;

C2. Contexts and Influences: demonstrate an understanding of the sociocultural and historical contexts of media arts;

C3. Responsible Practices: demonstrate an understanding of responsible practices associated with producing, presenting, and experiencing media art works.

Your Report Card Grade will be determined as follows:

<p>Term work: 70% of your grade will be based on all of the evidence you have provided. It will reflect your most consistent level of achievement with special consideration given to more recent evidence.</p>	<p>Knowledge and Understanding 14% Emphasizes the ability to recall factual information, recognize fundamental concepts and the foundational skills of the subject/discipline. Demonstrate an understanding of the elements of art, principles of design and the overall expectations.</p> <p>Thinking 14% Emphasizes the thinking skills used in thinking processes to demonstrate the student's understanding of information they have processed. Use the creative and critical analysis processes for creation of original works and analysis of your own artwork and acknowledged artworks.</p> <p>Communication 21% Emphasizes the clear, precise and effective use of oral, written and visual language to communicate the student's understanding of information and ideas. Express and organize ideas and information through the art form, and in oral and written forms.</p> <p>Application 21% Emphasizes the application and integration of knowledge, skills, processes and techniques to produce evidence of the student's understanding. Through the creative process, you will use materials, processes, and technology to create/produce media art that express their chosen meaning or intent.</p>
<p>Final Evaluation: 30% of your grade will be determined at the end of the course.</p>	<p>30% Final Performance Task 20% Practical task 10% Written task</p>
<p>Your final grade will be calculated by combining your Term (70%) grade and your Exam and Performance Task Evaluations (30%).</p>
